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KERRY COMMUNITY COUNCIL RESPONSE TO PRE-PLANNING CONSULTATION

Item	Areas of Concern (headings extracted from the Planning Statement 2023).	Comment
3a.i	Built Heritage	The Council are concerned about the preservation of Brynllywarch Hall, which is a Grade 11 listed house built in 1829 by William Pugh of Berriew.
		An option for the incorporation of the existing historical building and site should have been presented as part of the pre-planning consultation.
		This option would have negated the majority of the concerns detailed below.
3a.ii	Access & Highway Safety	The proposed access to the new site raises the following concerns;
		Page 13 of the Planning Statement that all construction traffic, staff and transported pupils will travel via the B4368, over Pentre Bridge and onto the school via the C2012. This access route is not enforceable as there is no way of ensuring that traffic use this route. Therefore, generating even more traffic via the Code Red, sub-standard A489/Common Road junction.
		The Council note that a road safety audit is to be completed w/c 6th March however the Council would like to raise the issue that part of the proposed route does not accommodate passing traffic i.e., single lane only with limited passing places. In addition, part of the route is subject to the national speed limit and will need to be speed restricted for safety reasons.
		The Council noted the increase in traffic during and after construction and raised concerns regarding the impact on the local environment/ residents.
		The Council expressed concern regarding the unacceptable amount of mud left on the highway by vehicles entering and leaving the proposed site where the trees have recently been felled.
3a.iii	Open Space	The Council raised the issue of the loss of two greenfield sites (2.52 hectares), which would not be

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		an issue if the existing site had been considered as a development option.
3a.iv	Biodiversity	The Council are concerned about the impact on biodiversity utilising 2 greenfield sites. Immediate impacts can include loss of habitat, translocation of flora and fauna from one area to another and loss of green, open spaces from the Welsh countryside. Potential for increased pollution during the development, increased traffic and associated noise disrupting wildlife and the potential to create a pollution incident/problem, that previously did not exist. Therefore, the brownfield site should be considered
3a.v	Drainage	before a greenfield site. There is no mains drainage therefore a Sustainable Drainage System will be incorporated in an External Plant Compound containing sprinkler tank, hydrant tank, pump room, water treatment plant and Swale. There is a potential for environmental/statutory nuisance issues for the adjacent properties that were not affected previously by the existing site e.g. noise, smells and insects.

The Chair thanked Cllrs C.Seal, D.Lush & G.Evans on behalf of Cllr V Wildish for the input on the Pre-Planning Consultation Presentation provided to the Council.
